COURSE DESCRIPTION

Study of the techniques necessary to write short fiction. Students will create, polish and workshop original work, while learning the essential techniques of short fiction—plot, character, narrative, setting, point-of-view, and scene.

COURSE GOALS

The student will:

1. Recognize the basic elements of a short story.
2. Recognize literary techniques and terms used in fiction.
3. Demonstrate the relationship between characters and plot.
4. Create dialogues, scenes, and summaries.
5. Write from a variety of viewpoints.
6. Determine the role of voice in creating fiction.
7. Create effective settings.
8. Write several varieties of short fiction.
9. Recognize different varieties of conflict.
10. Practice revision.
11. Respond to the work of others in the class.
12. Organize time to work independently.
13. Research contemporary fiction online and in traditional formats.
14. Recognize the differences between commercial and interpretive fiction.
