# EDISON STATE COMMUNITY COLLEGE VET 160S HUSBANDRY, WELLNESS, AND NUTRITION OF SMALL ANIMALS 3 CREDIT HOURS

#### COURSE DESCRIPTION

Overview of the basic husbandry of dogs and cats with a focus on wellness and preventive medicine. The course will introduce common breeds, proper grooming, and physical examination. Emphasis on completing proper handling/restraint, performing physical examination, grooming, completing ocular diagnostic tests, and administering oral medication will be incorporated with 32 hours of hands-on experience. Prerequisite: VET 101S, VET 125S, VET 151S. Lab fee.

- 15. Pet food labels, guaranteed analysis, and ingredient panels
- 16. Hospital nutrition protocols
- 17. Nutritional factors in common disease conditions.
- 18. Nutritional supplements (benefits and potential toxicities)
