NUR 275S CARING FOR CHILDBEARING FAMILIES/INTEGRATING LEARNED NURSING CONCEPTS 9.5 CREDIT HOURS

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Focuses on the knowledge, skills, and attitudes needed to safely practice evidence-based, patient-centered nursing. Competency areas include: leadership and management; the integration of learned concepts and skills in the care of groups of clients; and a focus on child-bearing families. Emphasis is on helping the capstone student integrate and apply the knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary to make sound clinical judgments and improve the quality and safety of the health care systems within which they work. Clinical opportunities include a 96-hour internship with a preceptor in a hospital setting and a variety of community placements that focus on children and expectant mothers. Prerequisite: NUR 265S with a grade of 'C' or better. Lab fee.
